National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) 3-Part Webinar Series

The U.S. Environmental Protection agency (EPA) is hosting a three-part webinar series on the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for communities. Under the Clean Air Act (CAA), the EPA is required to set the NAAQS and review those standards every five years for six common air pollutants (also known as "criteria" air pollutants). There are NAAQS for ground-level ozone (O3);

particulate matter (PM); carbon monoxide (CO), lead (Pb), sulfur dioxide (SO₂), and nitrogen dioxide (NO₂). These criteria air pollutants are found all across the United States and can harm your health, the environment, and cause property damage.

In this webinar series you will learn how the EPA: 1) sets, reviews and revises the primary (health) and secondary (environmental) standards; 2) designate areas that are meeting or not meeting these standards; and 3) works with areas to meet and maintain these standards.

During each 90-minute webinar, there will be an overview presentation of the topic followed by a question and answer session.

EPA's Local Government Advisory Committee (LGAC) is a federal advisory committee chartered in 1992 under the Federal Advisory Committee Act (FACA) to advise the EPA Administrator “from the field” on a broad range of environmental issues impacting local governments. Current LGAC committee members, and future qualified nominees, hold either elected or non-elected/appointed positions and possess leadership experience—whether managerial or technical/programmatic—in the following contexts: Small

community or township government (under 10,000 population); moderate-size or large city government; county government; state government; and, tribal government.

This notice solicits nominations to fill 10–15 vacancies on EPA's LGAC—currently comprised of 35 individuals—beginning in July, 2017. Vacancies are anticipated to be filled by September, 2017.

EPA researchers recently announced a citizen science study called Smoke Sense that will help determine the extent to which exposure to wildland fire smoke affects health and productivity and that will develop health risk communication strategies that protect public health during smoke days.

Individuals who want to contribute to science can participate in the study by using the Smoke Sense app, a publicly available mobile application in the Google Play store.

The study, being conducted during the 2017 fire season, will be the first of its kind known to use a mobile application to evaluate health effects from wildland fires experienced by those who participate and to test whether such an app communicates health risks effectively. Data gathered through Smoke Sense is anticipated to help EPA researchers and communities determine how smoke from fires impacts our health and productivity and gain important insights needed to develop health risk communication methods during smoky days. The Smoke Sense app can be used on Android phones and will be available for use on Apple devices in the future. Smoke Sense app user identities will be anonymous and non-identifiable. ANTHC opens RFPs for Air Quality Sub-Awards

Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium (ANTHC) recently released their FY18 Request for Proposals for Air Quality Sub-Awards. These sub-awards provide funding for federally recognized tribes in Alaska to address air quality concerns in their communities. Proposals should describe a project that will address an air quality concern in a tribal community such as road dust, indoor air quality, solid waste burning, ambient air pollution, and wood smoke. Awards can be funded up to \$20,000 and are limited to one sub-award per tribe. If an air quality project includes any type of monitoring, assessment/surveys, or data collection, ANTHC will assist in the development of the required Quality Assurance Project Plan. This opportunity is competitive and is funded by a Clean Air Act grant from the US Environmental Protection Agency – Region 10 that is administered by ANTHC.

DEADLINE: August 31, 2017

Please note: These Sub-awards are competitive and limited to only one Sub-award per Tribe. Please see the eligibility requirements below as they have changed from FY'17.

- Federally recognized Tribes within the State of Alaska

- Completed Phase I Air Quality Assessment submitted before or with application

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Region 10, is announcing the availability of indoor radon grants for Tribes. This State Indoor Radon Grant (SIRG) is critical to the Agency's national goal of minimizing and preventing radon-related lung cancer. Tribes may receive grant funds from EPA that help finance their radon risk reduction projects. To be eligible, tribal grant recipients are required to provide a minimum of 25% non-federal match for the first year of SIRG project; and 40% match in subsequent years of the project. Multiyear project proposals are not required. Total EPA Region 10 grant funding available for Tribes is \$24,000.
